THE FUTURE OF NORTHSIDE AREA PUBLIC POOLS

owa City's proposed changes to its public pools, including the two closest to the Northside – City Park and the Robert A. Lee Recreation Center – have elicited an outpouring of response from pool users and other concerned citizens. Resistance to the closing of the Robert A. Lee pool in downtown lowa City is particularly strong. In July, more than 160 local residents submitted a letter of protest to the City Council and local media regarding the closing of the Robert A. Lee pool: thegazette.com/guest-columnists/keep-robert-a-lee-pool-open/

Several Northside residents have been gathering signatures to contest the proposed redesign of the City Park pool, which the Parks & Rec Commission has already recommended to City Council. In the proposed new design, the main body of the pool will have "spray features" and a "current channel" for young children, while leaving fewer opportunities for swim lessons, lap swimming, aquacizers, and general pool users of all ages.

Northside resident, Gina H, commented that the City Park pool can be updated to include zero-entry

to increase accessibility without taking away the pool's ability to serve a wide range of people. She said, "I don't want water features to dominate the pool to the exclusion of other uses, but I do support water features that will increase the appeal and draw of the pool while being compatible with other uses—general swim and play area for all ages, lap lanes, and a diving well."

The City's recreational facilities contribute greatly to our quality of life on the Northside and beyond. The City is willing to revisit the possibility of restoring the skinned infield. Happy Hollow ballfield has been a favorite location for pick-up games, LGBTQ softball teams, and the Writers' Workshop annual Poets vs Fiction Writers softball game.

724 RONALDS STREET UPDATE

AT ITS WORK SESSION ON JULY 12, the City Council majority approved moving forward with the staff proposal to build an affordable singlefamily home at 724 Ronalds Street. The proposed project will be a collaborative effort with the City of Iowa City, The Housing Fellowship, Iowa City Community School District, and the Home Builders Association Vocational Training Council. On July 14, the Historic Preservation Commission gave its support to the project as well, with the understanding that the design will come to them for approval as the property falls within the Brown Street Historic District. Whether the double lot remains as a single parcel or is divided in two will be determined at a later time.

While I completely endorse the collaborative aspect of the project, the decision to build a single-

family home does not retain the fundamental reason the City purchased the property in 2016: to explore the possibilities of Missing Middle housing for diversity and affordability in the Northside Neighborhood, and by extension the other close-in historic neighborhoods. Missing Middle housing types include duplexes, of which there are outstanding examples in the Northside and other Iowa City neighborhoods, including Longfellow.

Aside from adding housing diversity, Missing Middle housing significantly lowers development costs (most notably, land acquisition) by distributing it over more than one dwelling. Lowering the development cost per dwelling is essential to a viable affordable housing strategy.

A Northside neighborhood meeting will be scheduled once the project team has developed the preliminary concept. Please stay tuned.

Streetscape Gardening

I f you've walked, biked, or driven by the 400 block of Church Street in recent months, you can't miss it: A prolific urban garden that begins outside the fenced-in yard and takes up the entire right of way between the sidewalk and the street. Bushy rows of tomatoes, squash, potatoes, carrots, beans, sweet corn, and more grow in profusion. Passersby stop by to marvel, admire, and ask: "What's going on here?"



Northside resident Thomas Agran is the creator of this street-side garden, the result of a lifelong gardening habit and a neighbor willing to lend her property to something other than lawn.



"I don't have any sun in my own yard, and was looking for a place nearby where I could grow vegetables," Thomas says. "The property on Church Street has great sun exposure, and when

I spoke to the neighbor living there, she was not only willing to give me the space, but was enthused about the garden and basically said, 'do whatever you want!'"

The result is a very visible demonstration of how under-used urban spaces can be turned into productive food sources — an important lesson at a time when inflation is making fresh produce increasingly expensive. Thomas has been using much of the garden's bounty to feed his own family and shares the excess with friends and neighbors.

Thomas also has been gratified by the response from the public. He reports that drivers often pull over to ask about the garden when he and daughter Nina Lisette are working there. Even the City approves, reassuring Thomas that the garden meets all City regulations for right-of-way plantings, which need to stay under 4 feet in height (although the tomatoes may be pushing it). Thomas says he plans to replant again next year. We can't wait to see what comes up.
